# **Smart feeding**







#### Smart Feeding: An approach that protects street dogs

Smart feeding supports street dogs in need while minimizing dependency, conflict, and harm. By adopting careful feeding practices, we can ensure the well-being of dogs and peaceful coexistence with the community.

## 1. Feed Only When Necessary

Only feed sick, old, lactating, or starving dogs and orphaned animals. Healthy dogs forage independently. Foraging is important for a dog's well-being.

### 2. Do not feed regularly

Feed occasionally and in small quantities to prevent dependency and preserve natural foraging skills.

## 3. Prevent Congregation

Spread feeding locations to reduce fights and community complaints. Stop feeding temporarily if dogs congregate or show undesired behaviours like chasing/barking.

## 4. Practice invisible feeding

Feed during quiet hours and away from busy areas to avoid complaints.

### 5. Clean Up

Remove leftovers and waste to maintain cleanliness and community goodwill.

## 6. Reduce dependency gradually

If dogs rely on regular feeding, taper quantity and frequency while monitoring their foraging and health.

#### 7. Avoid treating street dogs like pets

Pet-like treatment of street dogs leads to conflict behaviours and has negative consequences for them.

#### 8. Adapt as needed

Pause or modify feeding and completely ignore street dogs if they start chasing, barking or mobbing people.

## 9. Engage with the community

Address concerns collaboratively to resolve conflicts.

#### 10. Vaccinate regularly

Ensure dogs are vaccinated regularly, particularly against rabies.

#### 11. Ensure access to fresh water

Providing drinking water is more important than providing food to street dogs.

#### 12. Do not rely solely on current laws about feeding and street dogs

Laws protecting street dogs can be challenged. Ensuring community goodwill enables dogs' safety and acceptance.
